Cleveland Metroparks Zoo works to secure a future for wildlife around the world by addressing human-wildlife conservation issues that threaten species survival. We leverage science, education, and strategic partnerships to protect species in the wild, empower conservationists in the field, and build conservation capacity.

Many animals around the world - including tigers, elephants, rhinos and slow loris - are in danger of disappearing in our lifetime.





Giraffe numbers have decreased by nearly 40% in the last 15 years.

More than half of Asia's turtle species are threatened with extinction.

Andean bears and their habitats are disappearing.
